LEARNER AGENCY MENTOR YEAR 12



She'll remember the Class of 2025 as wild cards speaking of wild cards, she used to sneak off to metal gigs back in high school!







Horizons Women's Hub



The Horizons Women's Hub at Yeronga SHS continues to empower young women to lead with confidence, compassion, and courage. Through a series of workshops and events, the program provides a safe, supportive space for students to connect, share experiences, and explore topics that matter most to them — from healthy relationships to leadership and self-worth.

This year, the Hub welcomed the Queensland Women's Health team, who led a heartfelt and empowering discussion on building and maintaining respectful relationships. The session encouraged open conversation around self-esteem, boundaries, and mutual respect — finishing with a creative **henna art activity** that brought students together in reflection and celebration.

To close the year, the Hub hosted a special Breakfast with award-winning poet and speaker Anisa Nandaula, catered by Mu'ooz Eritrean Restaurant, which supports women from refugee backgrounds. The event celebrated women's voices, leadership, and the power of community, inspiring students to continue lifting each other up and embracing their strengths.

At Yeronga, the Horizons Women's Hub remains a cornerstone of empowerment — nurturing the next generation of strong, self-aware, and socially conscious young women.

















First Nations - Deadly Leaders ▼

From smoking ceremonies at Yeronga Celebrates to classroom projects and art workshops, our school continues to create spaces where all students feel seen, heard, and valued.















Top Blokes



The **Top Blokes Program** continues to make a powerful impact at Yeronga SHS, fostering resilience, leadership, and wellbeing among our young men. Through a combination of mentoring, workshops, and community engagement, students have developed confidence, empathy, and the skills to navigate life's challenges with integrity and strength.

A highlight of the year was the **Top Blokes Evening**, held on Friday 13 June during **Men's Mental Health Week**. The event brought together students, families, staff, and community guests — including **Mark Bailey MP** — for an inspiring night of open conversation, connection, and celebration. Yeronga SHS is proud to lead the way in supporting young men to become confident, compassionate, authentic leaders and community-minded individuals.
















Breakfast Club














Kokoda Challenge



In 2025, Yeronga State High School made its **Kokoda Challenge debut** — and what a debut it was. On June 7, eight student and staff teams took on the 30km and 48km trails through Brisbane's rugged D'Aguilar National Park, facing steep climbs, mud, and fatigue with courage and determination. Every single Yeronga team crossed the finish line — a **100% completion rate**, nearly **\$10,000 raised**, and countless memories made.

Inspired by the spirit of the 1942 Kokoda Campaign, students trained for months — completing endurance hikes at Mt Coot-tha, tackling 15km and 20km milestones, and supporting one another through every challenge.

To help fund their participation, students combined their efforts with the **Young Entrepreneurs Program**, raising over **\$200** through handmade crochet sales at the Vend Markets in Annerley. The entire school community also joined in through a **Free Dress Day** fundraiser supporting the Kokoda Youth Foundation.

The Kokoda Challenge embodied everything Yeronga stands for — **resilience**, **connection**, **and community spirit**. Congratulations to our teams for showing what true strength looks like.















This, combined with a Valentines themed bake sale helped add an extra sprinkle of love and good vibes to start the year!
















Building Active Citizens

His innovative methods have seen year-on-year improvement in results and earned the school Gold Medal status from the Queensland Association of Mathematics Teachers.

Beyond the numbers, Ben's greatest success lies in his relationships with students. He ensures every learner feels supported, confident, and excited to take on challenges — whether they're folding fractals, calculating coordinates, or simply discovering the joy of learning.


Through his leadership, Ben continues to prove that maths can be creative, collaborative, and full of life.





On Tuesday, 22 July 2025, our Year 12 Biology students participated in an engaging Genetics Workshop at The University of Queensland. The experience deepened their understanding of Unit 4 content and provided valuable handson practice with laboratory techniques central to the study of genetics.

Guided by Dr Gurion Ang and supported by current undergraduate mentors, students explored advanced concepts such as recombinant DNA through bacterial transformation, gene regulation, DNA extraction, polymerase chain reaction (PCR), and gel electrophoresis.

In addition to the workshop, students toured active laboratories within the School of Biological Sciences, gaining insight into real-world research and university life. The day was a resounding success — sparking curiosity, building practical scientific skills, and inspiring many students to consider future study and careers in biology, genetics, and microbiology.






Senior Psychology Excursion

Year 11 Psychology students embarked on an eye-opening excursion to the Integrated Pathology Learning Centre at the Royal Brisbane and Women's Hospital. During the two-hour session, students examined real human brain specimens, explored the major lobes of the brain, and investigated the physical effects of neurological disorders such as Alzheimer's, Parkinson's, and epilepsy.

The visit also provided valuable insight into the ethical considerations of pathology and the evolution of mental health treatment in Australia — including confronting historical practices like lobotomies and institutionalisation. This hands-on experience powerfully connected classroom learning to real-world application, leaving students both inspired and reflective about the complexity of the human mind.











We can't wait to see their innovative ideas transform into a space the whole school community will enjoy.














Skateboard Design Project


















Year 7 History



The challenge brought financial literacy, ethics, and critical thinking to life in an unforgettable, hands-on experience.







Our strong community and industry partnerships continue to thrive. This year, students participated in multiple site visits to local businesses, gaining firsthand knowledge of workplace expectations, industry trends, and vocational pathways. A highlight was the regular tours of the Yeronga Heart construction site, located right next door to the school. These visits have been particularly inspiring for students interested in construction, architecture, and project management, offering a live case study of innovation and collaboration in action.

Through these experiences, many of our students have taken the next step by securing School-Based Apprenticeships and Traineeships (SATs). These paid, nationally recognised qualifications allow students to work one day a week while completing their Queensland Certificate of Education (QCE).

Link & Launch - Supporting Yeronga Graduates Beyond the Gate


As our Year 12 students prepare for life after school, Yeronga SHS is proud to offer continued support through the Link & Launch Program, led by our dedicated coordinator, Serena Camilleri.

This term, Serena delivered a hands-on Resume and Cover Letter Workshop to help students confidently take their next steps into work, training, or further study. The session covered everything from crafting stand-out resumes and mastering Applicant Tracking Systems (ATS) to writing persuasive cover letters that capture employers' attention. Students left with practical, personalised tools — and the confidence to use them.

But the support doesn't end at graduation. Link & Launch is a Queensland Department of Education initiative hosted right here at Yeronga SHS. Now operating across 36 schools, the program has helped more than 3,200 Year 12 graduates transition successfully into study, training, or employment — with 87% still engaged 18 months later.

Serena continues to provide one-on-one guidance for Yeronga graduates, helping them explore their passions, prepare job applications, and connect with real-world opportunities.




